History

Revolutionary War

The United Kingdom's East India Company tea ships' cargo are burned at Annapolis, Maryland on October 14, 1773.

The US Navy was established when the Continental Congress authorizes construction of two warships on October 13, 1775.

Americans beat the British in 2nd Battle of Saratoga on October 7, 1777.

War of 1812

In a naval engagement on Lake Erie, American forces capture two British ships, the HMS Detroit and HMS Caledonia on October 9, 1812.

Civil War

In the Battle of Santa Rosa Island, Union troops repel a Confederate attempt to capture Fort Pickens on October 9, 1861.

The Union is victorious in the largest Civil War action to take place in Kentucky, the Battle of Perryville, October 8, 1862.

In the Battle of Bristoe Station, Confederate General Robert E. Lee forces fail to drive the Union Army out of Virginia on October 14, 1863.

World War I

In the Argonne Forest in France, U.S. Corporal Alvin C. York leads an attack that kills 25 German soldiers and captures 132 on October 8, 1918.

World War II

United States Marine Corps forces withdraw back across the Matanikau River on Guadalcanal after destroying most of the Imperial Japanese Army's 4th Infantry Regiment on October 9, 1942.

In the Battle of Cape Esperance located on the northwest coast of Guadalcanal, United States Navy ships intercept and defeat a Japanese fleet on their way to reinforce troops on the island on October 10, 1942.

The Battle for Henderson Field on the island of Guadalcanal begins October 23, 1942.

The Western Task Force, destined for North Africa, departs from Hampton Roads, Virginia with 100 naval vessels on October 23, 1942 to participate in Operation Torch.

The U.S. Fifth Army begins an assault crossing of the Volturno River in Italy on October 12, 1943.

The U.S. 8th Air Force loses 60 B-17 Flying Fortresses during an assault on Schweinfurt, Germany on October 14, 1943.

The city of Aachen falls to American forces making it the first German city to fall to the Allies on October 21, 1944.

Korean War

U.S. Forces cross the 38th Parallel on October 7, 1951

The month-long Battle of Heartbreak Ridge ends on October 15, 1951 as the 2nd Infantry Division seizes the ridge.

Vietnam War

The 1st Air Cavalry Division launches a new operation, seeking to destroy North Vietnamese forces in Pleiku in the Central Highlands of Vietnam on October 23, 1965.

Cold War - Post Vietnam - Present

The Cuban Missile Crisis begins as a U-2 flight over Cuba takes photos of Soviet nuclear weapons being installed on the island on October 14, 1962.

The United States sends a ten-ship task force to Grenada on October 21, 1983.

Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan begins on October 5, 2001. Also known as the Global War on Terror (GWOT).

Other Interesting October Dates

The U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland opens October 10, 1845.

6th Infantry Division

In World War I the 6th Division was in so many engagements and made so many long marches about France that it was nicknamed "The Sight-Seeing Sixth." The 6th in World War II did a pretty good job of upholding that reputation. Its six-pointed star shoulder patch has been seen throughout the Pacific, from Hawaii to the far reaches of Japan.

No division had a tougher assignment in the recapture of the Philippines than the 6th. It landed at Lingayen Gulf, Luzon, on D-day, January 9, 1945, and immediately took to the hills in pursuit of the enemy. While most of the other invading divisions were working on fairly flat terrain, the 6th was in the mountains, hacking away at the formidable enemy

positions.

Medal of Honor Recipient

Forrest Lee Vosler
"Woody"

8th Air Force
303rd Bombardment Group
358th Bomb Squadron

20 December 1943
Mission to Bremen, Germany

General Order 73, 6 September 1944.

For conspicuous gallantry in action against the enemy above and beyond the call of duty while serving as a radio operator-air gunner on a heavy bombardment aircraft in a mission over Bremen, Germany, on 20 December 1943. After bombing the target, the aircraft in which T/Sgt. Vosler was serving was severely damaged by antiaircraft fire, forced out of formation, and immediately subjected to repeated vicious attacks by enemy fighters. Early in the engagement a 20-mm. cannon shell exploded in the radio compartment, painfully wounding T/Sgt. Vosler in the legs and thighs. At about the same time a direct hit on the tail of the ship seriously wounded the tail gunner and rendered the tail guns inoperative. Realizing the great need for firepower in protecting the vulnerable tail of the ship, T/Sgt.

Vosler, with grim determination, kept up a steady stream of deadly fire. Shortly thereafter another 20-mm. enemy shell exploded, wounding T/Sgt. Vosler in the chest and about the face. Pieces of metal lodged in both eyes, impairing his vision to such an extent that he could only distinguish blurred shapes. Displaying remarkable tenacity and courage, he kept firing his guns and declined to take first-aid treatment. The radio equipment had been rendered inoperative during the battle, and when the pilot announced that he would have to ditch, although unable to see and working entirely by touch, T/Sgt. Vosler finally got the set operating and sent out distress signals despite several lapses into unconsciousness. When the ship ditched, T/Sgt. Vosler managed to get out on the wing by himself and hold the wounded tail gunner from slipping off until the other crewmembers could help them into the dinghy. T/Sgt. Vosler's actions on this occasion were an inspiration to all serving with him. The extraordinary courage, coolness, and skill he displayed in the face of great odds, when handicapped by injuries that would have incapacitated the average crewmember, were outstanding.

We celebrate the service of these individuals, we tell the historical story of these selfless patriots.

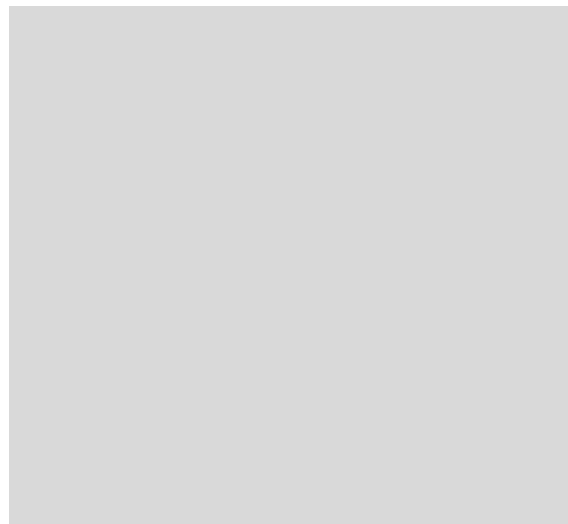
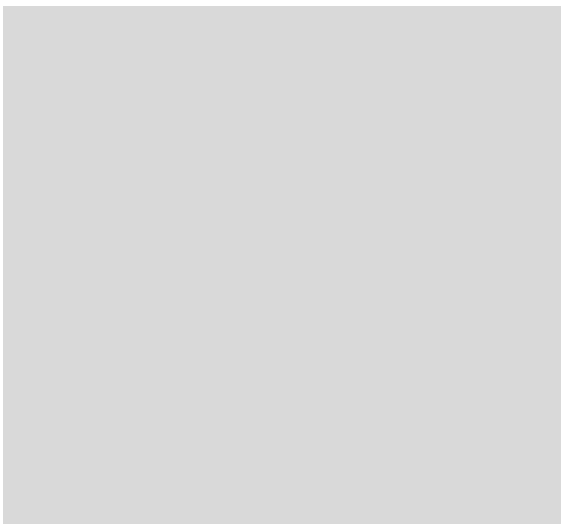
---- The Sons of Liberty Museum ----

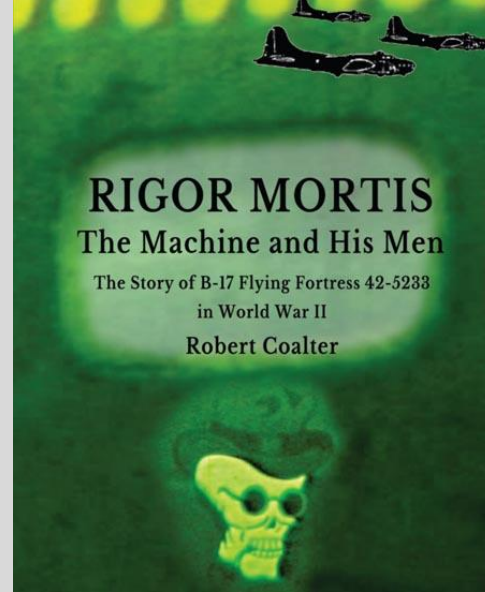
